- Alliteration

The repetition of an initial consonant sound.

- Hyperbole

An extravagant statement; the use of exaggerated terms for the purpose of emphasis or heightened effect.

The use of words to convey the opposite of their literal meaning. A statement or situation where the meaning is contradicted by the appearance or presentation of the idea.

- Situational-the result of an action is contrary to the desired or expected effect.
- Dramatic-Where the audience knows more than the character (think of scary movies).

- Verbal-a statement in which the meaning that a speaker employs is sharply different from the meaning that is ostensibly expressed (sarcasm)

- Metaphor

An implied comparison between two unlike things that actually have something important in common.

- Onomatopoeia

The use of words that imitate the sounds associated with the objects or actions they refer to.

- Oxymoron

A figure of speech in which incongruous or contradictory terms appear side by side

A figure of speech in which an inanimate object or abstraction is endowed with human qualities or abilities.

A play on words, sometimes on different senses of the same word and sometimes on the similar sense or sound of different words.

- Understatement

A figure of speech in which a writer or speaker deliberately makes a situation seem less important or serious than it is.
