<ul> <li>Verbal-a statement in which the meaning that a speaker employs is sharply different from the meaning that is ostensibly expressed (sarcasm)</li> </ul>
Metaphor An implied comparison between two unlike things that actually have something important in common.
Onomatopoeia The use of words that imitate the sounds associated with the objects or actions they refer to.

	ersonification figure of speech in which an inanimate object or abstraction is endowed with human qualities or abilities.
A	un play on words, sometimes on different senses of the same word and sometimes on the similar sense or bund of different words.
A	imile stated comparison (usually formed with "like" or "as") between two fundamentally dissimilar things the ave certain qualities in common.
A	Inderstatement figure of speech in which a writer or speaker deliberately makes a situation seem less important or erious than it is.

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
